
For the encore, Red



Sunrise Credit Union is announcing a significant \$100,000 donation to the Spirit Sands Medical Clinic in Glenboro today. This generous contribution will help ensure the initiative's success.

The Spirit Sands Medical Clinic's vision is 'To meet health needs and provide comprehensive care for individuals, families and communities.'

When completed, the clinic will be a 3,250-square-foot facility accommodating 3-4 health practitioners. It will offer a range of services and will serve the municipalities of Glenboro-South Cypress, Prairie Lakes, Argyle, Victoria and Oakland-Wawanesa.

"Basic health care is crucial for all neighbouring communities in the area. It is unrealistic to expect residents to travel more than 30 minutes in rural Manitoba," said Spirit Sands Medical Clinic Board Chair Ron Jeffries. "This proposed joint effort with surrounding communities is critical to keeping healthcare services localized and available for all residents."

The estimated cost of the project is \$2.5 million, and the fundraising effort is currently about halfway to the goal.

"We're proud to support the work of the Spirit Sands Medical Clinic Board on this significant and vital capital project for the community," said Sunrise Credit Union CEO/ President Tim Klassen. We believe in giving back to the community, and we are proud to support this new build. Together, we can ensure that our family and neighbours have access to healthcare for future generations."


The project is expected to commence in the spring of 2025 and will take approximately one year to complete.

On Monday, December 9, twenty-eight different organizations gathered in the Morden Legion basement hall to "celebrate the legacy of giving". Colleen Lyne and her late husband Bill wanted to support groups and organizations that help to improve life for the people of southern Manitoba. As Colleen noted, "Bill and I hoped this contribution would truly reflect our

appreciation for all that our community has given us....[We] have always felt a deep commitment to giving back to the Morden and surrounding community that has supported us throughout our lives here."

Here's some background on Colleen and Bill:

After completing grade 11 in 1956, Colleen Moore of Pilot Mound became a permit teacher at Star Mound School west of Snowflake. Colleen was only 16 years old teaching grades 1 to 8 or 9, barely older than some of her pupils in the one-room country school.

She had found her calling, though, and spent the next many decades of her life in the education field. She taught in England, Ontario, and other places around Manitoba, instructing teachers in the Caribbean, earning degrees and eventually a Masters of Education.

Bill Lyne and his brothers Joe, Ken and Mervin

were raised on a farm east of Snowflake. Bill was in the Canadian Navy, then worked as a correction officer at Stoney Mountain Penitentiary, before he found his niche – machinery sales.

In 1966 Colleen Moore of Pilot Mound married Bill Lyne of Snowflake. He was involved in different machinery dealerships including in Pilot Mound for five years and then Morden where he established Southman

Agri Sales.

The Lynes have lived in Morden since 1978. Bill sold the business in 1998. The couple never had children of their own, but doted on Bill's nieces and nephews.

Colleen had a stroke in 1990, making mobility and speech difficult, but the gleam in her eye and her sense of humor never abated. Bill devotedly looked after Colleen and they both enjoyed retirement. Bill died in December of 2021.

The pamphlet at the presentation outlined: "Colleen & Bill Lyne...Together, they shared a vision of supporting local organizations and enhancing the lives of people in their community...Colleen and Bill's generosity is guided by a simple but powerful goal: to strengthen the here and now' of our community."

Previously Colleen decided to support the Morden Legion, Pembina Thresherman's Museum, Western School Division graduating students in

need and the Morden Friendship Centre.

For the Boundary Trails Health Centre Foundation's capital campaign, she donated \$750,000 for the new echocardiography suite as part of the BTHC expansion.

On December 9th, Colleen handed out cheques totalling thousands of dollars to worthwhile groups.

Bill's brother Merv welcomed people and outlined some of the organizations who would be receiving money and explained why they were picked to receive funding. It was rather thrilling to watch representatives of group after group, go up to Colleen, meet her and thank her in person for such a wonderful gift. As her brother-in-law Merv said, "Colleen can appreciate and enjoy making the donation in the present, not after she's passed."

Star Mound Historical Society received funding because it was the first school where Colleen taught.

"If a conversation is hard, it is probably one worth having" describes the discussion about Palliative Care. People tend to believe that Palliative Care is only needed at end-oflife. In reality, Palliative Care is applicable early in the course of illness and will enhance quality of life and may also positively influence the course of the illness.

A Palliative approach to Health Care is used when a patient's/client's goals of care shift from treatments which are intended to cure, to goals which are focused on quality of life and symptom management.

The Palliative approach helps patients/clients achieve the best quality of life right up to the end of life. A person does not need to be close to death to take a Palliative approach to health care. This approach can be taken in any hospital, personal care home or in the patient's home. It is an approach to care for patients of any age diagnosed with a life-limiting illness.

You can find more information about Palliative

Care in Southen Health by going on their website - you can also ask for a referral for Palliative Care on that website.

Our program and volunteers are available throughtout the community and municipality whether the individual is residing at home, hospital or care home. The volunteers provide physical, social, emotional and spiritual needs for clients and their families and friends.

They can provide respite for families, alleviate isolation by friendly visiting and can provide support in bereavement. We have several active dedicated Volunteers in our program but would always welcome new Volunteers! If you are interested in becoming a volunteer for our program please contact me: 204-242-4461.

Our volunteers are not only available for Palliative Care clients but also "friendly visit" our residents at Pembina Manitou Health Centre. These friendly visits could also happen in your home! Many of our residents at Pembina Manitou Health Care (PMHC) are not from our community or even municipality and appreciate these visits so much!

Manitoba's Hidden Reality: The Two-Tier Healthcare System

For decades, Manitobans have been assured of a universal healthcare system, one that promises equal access to care for all. However, the reality is starkly different: Manitoba already operates a two-tier healthcare system. This is not a sensational claim but a lived experience for countless Manitobans, including myself.

The current NDP government prides itself on pouring more money than ever into healthcare, but the results tell a different story. Wait times for critical procedures remain unacceptable, emergency rooms are overwhelmed, and many Manitobans find themselves turning to private options or even leaving the province in desperation.

I witnessed this firsthand when a loved one needed medical attention that the Manitoba system couldn't provide in a timely manner. Despite our best efforts to navigate the public system, the wait stretched into months—time we simply didn't have. Left with no choice, we sought care outside the province (Grand Forks, ND). It was a

draining, costly experience but one that revealed the deep cracks in our healthcare system.

Looking back at our decision, I would definitely do it again! While some might call this a privilege, it was, in reality, a desperate move born out of necessity.

This story isn't unique. Many Manitobans, faced with long waitlists or unavailable services, must seek private care or leave the province, creating a divide between those who can afford alternatives and those who cannot.

The result?

A two-tier system where equity is nothing more than a distant ideal. Like it or not, Manitoba already has a two tier system. What's most troubling is that this divide grows even as the NDP government increases healthcare spending. Despite record funding, we are witnessing worsening outcomes and longer delays. It begs the question: where is this money going?

Simply spending more is not a solution if it doesn't address systemic inefficiencies, workforce shortages, and poor planning.

Is it time that we stop sending millions of dollars out of our province to provide essential care?

Are we tired of the tax dollars that simply evaporate into a failing system?

Manitoba's healthcare crisis has become a black hole for public funds, with little accountability or measurable improvement to show for it. Instead of investing in solutions that strengthen care here at home, we're seeing resources siphoned away while families are left to fend for themselves.

If we are to fix this broken system, we must prioritize transparency, incentivebased reform, and competition. Manitobans have the right to know how healthcare dollars are being spent and whether those expenditures are delivering meaningful results.

Transparency will hold decision-makers accountable and shine a light on inefficiencies that continue to plague the system.

We also need to introduce incentives to reward excellence and innovation. Healthcare workers and facilities that meet or exceed performance benchmarks should be recognized and supported. This will encourage higher standards of care across the board while motivating underperforming areas to improve.

Finally, competition must be part of the solution. By

Rock Lake Health District's Response to Winnipeg Free Press Article

We would like to acknowledge the article printed in the Free Press 'ERs in crisis in rural Manitoba' published on the front page of the Wednesday December 11, 2024 edition, specifically as it relates to our local facility at Rock Lake Hospital in Crystal City, MB.

Our facility is no different from many other health care sites which are balancing limited staffing resources with increasing demands. Rock Lake Hospital is the only community acute care site (non regional site) currently still operating with a 24/7 emergency room model within Southern Health Santé Sud.

Within the article there were some misleading facts: it was reported that our facility was open 24-7 every day in December 2023 and made comparisons to December 2024 closures. As frontline staff who work in the facility, we expect factual information to be shared to the public and reviewed such records in order to clarify.

In December 2023 there were 7 suspensions in comparison to the 12 total planned suspensions for the month of December 2024 – taking into account that number is fluid and can change on short notice.

Suspensions may occur for a number of reasons: • lack of personnel,

- staff accompanying clients during a transfer which then causes shortages at the facility,
- facility overcapacity or unsafe staffing levels due to the ward/inpatient needs which are tended to the by same staff providing care in the emergency room.

New this year, we have been forced to suspend emergency room services related to overcapacity on the inpatient ward – an ongoing problem that has been noted provincially.

The article also went on to report that 'Crystal City hospital has turned to agency nurses while grappling with a staff shortage'. We acknowledge a staffing shortage as well as the use of agency nurses, however in comparison to the months of April – Dec in 2023 and April - Dec

in 2024 we noted only a slight increase of agency nurse usage related to the increasing nursing shortages being experienced.

We want to acknowledge the staff and their dedication to providing care in our local facility, which is reflective of the staff working overtime, altering their work schedules and personal obligations to help limit the reliance on agency nurses.

We strive to continue to provide 24/7 emergency care but we are experiencing the systemic challenges being experienced throughout the province related to staffing shortages. With our current staffing, anything from sick calls, heavy workload, poor weather or road conditions can all cause a disruption to our services on short notice.

As we continue to strive to provide care close to home, please be mindful to the dedicated staff we have; they are often going above and beyond to ensure services are not disrupted and that care can be sought close to home.

allowing for a competitive framework within the public and private sectors, we can create a system that drives efficiency and better outcomes for patients.

Competition isn't about eroding universal care; it's about strengthening it by ensuring patients have access to timely, quality care when they need it most.

Manitobans deserve better than this patchwork system that forces families to make heartbreaking decisions. It's time to acknowledge the failings of our current approach and demand a healthcare

system that works for everyone—one that delivers on the promise of universal care, is transparent in its operations, and incentivizes improvement. Only then can we bridge the gap between our ideals and the reality so many of us face.


The sermon closed with prayer. The Benediction was Ephesians 3:20-21.

When I bring it up, he says his job is to make money, my job is to do the kid thing. I'm at the end. I can't do this by myself anymore. Please help!

Signed, Almost Done. Dear Done,

I can see why you are almost done. This is not the way things are meant to be. Let me try something different here. I'll give you two answers, one professional and the second my gut.

Professional Answer: It's essential to validate your feelings. You're not wrong for wanting your husband to be more involved with your family. Relationships and parenting work best as partnerships and it's understandable that his lack of engagement leaves you feeling unsupported and isolated.

Your husband has a very compartmentalized view of his role in the family focusing on financial contributions and expecting you to manage the rest. This division may reflect beliefs he holds about parenting or stress he's experiencing at work.

It could also stem from burnout, depression or difficulty transitioning from "work mode" to "family mode." However, these are explanations - not excusesfor his lack of involvement. I'm not convinced they apply in your case.

Practical Steps to Consider:

1. Choose a Calm Moment for Conversation

Pick a time when things are quiet - outside of an argument or emotionally charged situation. Share your feelings without blame. Use "I" statements like, "I feel overwhelmed and lonely when I'm handling everything with the kids on my own. I need your help and involvement to feel like we're a team."

2. Clarify Expectations Together

Discuss what you both envision for family life. What does "doing the kid thing" mean to him? What does he think is fair for his role at home? Share your perspective and try to find common ground.

3. Propose Small Changes

Start with low-pressure, manageable commitments, like joining for dinner as a family or attending one event a month. Frame it as a way to strengthen his bond with the children.

4. Consider Professional Support

A family or couple's

therapist can help mediate this conversation and uncover underlying issues. Therapy can provide tools for better communication and mutual understanding.

5. Prioritize Your Well-Being

While you're advocating for changes, take time to care for yourself. Lean on supportive friends or family or consider joining a group where you can share experiences with others in similar situations.

6. Reflect on Limits and Boundaries

If your husband remains unwilling to engage, consider what that means for you and your family. It's okay to set boundaries around what you can and cannot do alone. You deserve to feel supported and not like you're facing this alone.

Gut Answer: Your husband has made it clear he has no interest in being an active partner or parent. He's checked out of family life, leaving you to handle everything while he kicks back and acts like an entitled bank machine. That's not a partnership - that's exploitation.

If he refuses to step up after you've tried to communicate, it's time to stop carrying this dead weight. Punt him and make sure the door hits him on the ass on his way out. You and your kids deserve better than this. Focus on building a life where you're supported and respected, even if that means doing it without him.

government needs your money to support this bloat.

In December, we find ourselves embroiled in a postal strike that is crippling many businesses, especially in rural areas, during the run-up to Christmas. Timing is everything. Given that Canada Post is a crown corporation, one could safely assume that it runs in a typical governmental style. Wouldn't you like to be a fly on the wall and observe how efficiently the Post Office is run? I certainly would.

day (January 20, 2025) to come up with an action plan in order to avoid the tariffs.

I think a good start would be to tighten down our own borders so that the bad guys and drugs don't enter Canada. If they're not here in the first place, they can't go south. I'm no expert on this but it seems logical.

THE HARDER YOU WORK, THE MORE YOU PAY.

Lest we forget, there was no such thing as income tax in Canada until 1917. We then implemented a "temporary income tax" to help pay for our involvement in World War I. We still have it and it has grown over the years.

Income taxes have always been confusing to me. Having just reviewed to earn money, the higher your tax rate will be.

I'm talking about the rate of tax on taxable income. One could question the incentive to work harder and produce more results when you are literally penalized for doing so. Paying your "fair share" has different meanings to different people. What is we had one flat tax rate across the board? What if we had no income taxes at all? Huh?

When the big strategic picture becomes bleak, all options should be on the table. What if income tax was replaced by one large sales tax...like a big GST?

At the very least, people could then have more money in their pockets and they would make the decision as to how much of their hard-earned money the government

could get their hands on. Buy a lower priced product and pay less tax, to put it simply. Having that choice might be rather refreshing.

TARIFFS & EXCISE TAXES.

Prior to the introduction of income taxes in 1917, the federal government's sole source of income was tariffs and excise taxes. In a nutshell, that refers to fees paid on goods coming into the country. If you've ever come back from a trip with items that are over the "duty-free limit" and had to pay, then you're familiar with this subject.

Could we replace income taxes with tariffs? Could we combine tariffs and one big sales tax? I don't know. It would take some experts - with a clear set of objectives and strong leadership - to figure that out. Do we have that capability? Again, I don't know but I really hope so.



WE SPEND MONEY WE DON'T HAVE.

I was a youngster of about 7 years old when I first saw a bloated cow lying dead in a pasture. I had forgotten about that terrible sight. Until now.

terrible sight. Until now. The fact is, the government is spending more money than it takes in. Each year, that negative difference is called a deficit. And, our national debt consists of deficits that have piled up over the years. Pile interest on top of that and we have something that easily qualifies as a financial disaster. It would appear that something has to be done and - given the rate of our debt growth - it has to be done soon.

Our entire society and most especially, SMALL BUSINESS is at risk because of this untenable situation.

Gas Tax Cut Saves Families Almost \$600 Per Year

WINNIPEG, MB: The Canadian Taxpayers Federation is calling on Premier Wab Kinew to extend his gas tax cut and keep Manitoba families saving on fuel before it expires on Dec. 31.

"Kinew needs to extend the gas tax cut to protect Manitobans from a New Year's tax hike," said Gage Haubrich, CTF Prairie Director. "Manitoba families are saving hundreds of dollars because of the fuel tax cut, the government can't let them lose those savings."

The Manitoba government initially cut the 14 cent per litre provincial fuel tax on gasoline and diesel for six-months starting on Jan. 1. After two extensions, the cut is now scheduled to expire at the end of December.

Because of the gas tax cut, people are saving about \$10 every time they

fill up a sedan or minivan. Drivers save about \$13 every time they fill up a pick-up truck.

Manitoba's fuel prices have been the lowest in the country since the cut.

A Manitoba family filling up a minivan and a pick-up truck once every two weeks will have saved about \$587 over the course of the yearlong cut.

Polling shows that among those who are decided on the issue, 81 per cent of Manitobans support another gas tax cut extension and 78 per cent support making the fuel tax cut permanent.

"Manitobans shouldn't be forced to hold their breath waiting for higher fuel taxes during one of the most expensive times of the year," Haubrich said. "Kinew needs to extend the gas tax cut, so Manitobans don't wake up with a tax hike hangover on New Year's Day."



City of Morden Hosts Open House for Pembina River Water Supply Project

The City of Morden welcomed residents and stakeholders to the Morden Civic Centre on Monday, December 9th to share information and collect feedback on the proposed Morden Pembina River Water Supply Project.

While there was no formal presentation, attendees were free to review the information presented, pose questions to Council as well as provide their feedback and concerns. What follows are selected highlights from the information presented. For more information, maps and additional details, readers are encouraged to contact the City of Morden. Feedback and concerns should be sent to the City within the month as the Environmental Act Proposal is being finalized for submission.

Project Background

- The City of Morden produces drinking water for its residents using the Morden Water Treatment Plant.
- Most of Morden's drinking water comes from Lake Minnewasta, where water levels are controlled by an outlet structure.
- The available water license allocation is not sufficient to meet the current water demands.
 - The City of Morden

has identified a deficit in the water supply for the community for the near and distant future.

Forecasted Water Shortage

- No further allocations are available for Lake Minnewasta.
- This allocation is not sufficient to meet the current consumption needs and is significantly less than the projected demands into the future.
- The drought of 2021 highlighted the need for an additional water supply for the City. During this period, the community was at risk of running out of water and needed to take actions to reduce demands.

Investigation to Supplement Raw Water Source

- City of Morden identified the Pembina River as a potential water source to supplement deficit.
- The water required from the Pembina River is currently targeted to be withdrawn during the spring freshen period or other periods of high flow in the Pembina River.
- For the 20-year projections, the objective is to deliver 1.5 million cubic meters from the Pembina River to the Deadhorse Creek catchment per year pumping at ~295 L/s for 60 days during high flows
- For the 40-year projections, an increased allocation as high as 400 L/s pumping capacity will be needed. This allocation will require

additional approvals to be considered over and above those currently being proposed.

Pembina River Water Supply Project

- A route selection with the City was chosen that positioned the intake just east of PR 31 at the bridge over the Pembina River.
- The water from the Pembina River would be drawn from an intake located in the Pembina River to a pump station located on the

riverbank. The pump station would pump water to an inlet point of Lake Minnewasta.

• The new pipeline will be installed along the Right-of-Way of the Provincial Road which provides ease of access.

Environmental Licensing

• The project is a Class 2 Development subject to the Manitoba Environmental Ace and requires an Environment Ace License prior to construction.

- An Environment Act Proposal and Environmental Impact Assessment will be submitted to the Province of Manitoba to fulfill the licensing requirements under the Act.
- There will be a period for public comments on the Environment Ace Proposal and Environmental Impact Assessment as part of the licensing process.

Summary – Environmental Assessment

- No significant negative environmental impacts were predicted after mitigation measures were implemented.
- Most impacts are avoided by following the maintained rights-ofway along the Provincial

Highway and municipal roads.

- Construction can avoid aquatic impacts by implementing standard mitigation measures recommended by Fisheries and Oceans Canada to prevent harm to fish and fish habitat.
- Discharge to Deadhorse Creek is not expected to cause significant impacts to aquatic or terrestrial habitats downstream.
- Nutrient levels may increase in Lake Minnewasta and may require additional action to control algae growth in the future.
- Aquatic invasive species transfer can be controlled by stopping the water flow once water temperatures reach a defined threshold.
