
Santa Visits Pilot Mound

languages, food, religions, and music.

I learned a few words in seven different languages just to do my job. I made many friends with parents and/or grandparents who could not speak English and everyone got along just fine. **FURTHER AFIELD**

Later on, I spent a lot of time in the USA where I worked with people (International Operations Division of the company) from all over the world. I participated in many meetings with representatives from Columbia, Brazil, France, Sweden, Norway, Belgium, Germany, the UK, Australia, New Zealand, Singapore, China, Hong Kong, South Korea, Malaysia, Thailand, he munched on potato chips sandwiches (potato chips stuffed between 2 slices of bread) made from the lunch buffet because he liked his starches!

Warren from Australia had his own fiery hot chili powder (in a special container on his belt) to sprinkle on any food put in front of him. And then there was my good friend Jimmy from China who could could eat delicacies such as deep-fried pigeon heads and turtle steak but also loved a good, mediumrare (beef) steak dinner!

During our time in Japan, I was of course treated to a "subarashii" (wonderful) education in many things Japanese.



KEEP THE FAITH

The subject of religion and special holidays would often come up and I learned that most people - Christians and others knew what Christmas is all about. I knew a number of Buddhists and other non-Christians yet I never once heard anyone speak negatively about our Christmas; no one I knew was ever offended by it.

Another thing I learned - as I pause to think about it - is that people from all over the world are about as similar as they are different. They might eat different foods, speak different languages, participate in different activities, have different faiths and do things differently than we might but they all share one common trait - they all want to live their lives in happiness.

For many, it means they want to be free to make their own choices. The vast majority are honest, caring and upstanding, while being human - there are always a few that are not. That has nothing at all to do with their race or cultural background. Human weaknesses transcend any borders, skin colour or culture.

I have come to realize that people are most happy and respectful of others when they are serving them in some way. It must be built into people as part of our humanity. Perhaps that is what "Peace on Earth and Goodwill Toward Men" (Luke 2:14) is really all about.

Dear Therapist,

I love my mom but her constant negativity is taking a toll on me. She is a textbook "Negative Nelly." Whenever we talk, she focuses on everything that's going wrong in her life, people she doesn't like and why or criticizes me and my choices. I want to maintain a good relationship with her but *I feel exhausted and resentful* after our conversations. It makes for tough Christmas get-togethers. How can I set *healthy boundaries without* hurting her feelings or making her super angry?

Signed, Pulling My Hair Out

Dear Pulling,

Man, that's frustrating! Setting boundaries with loved ones, especially a parent, can be brutal but is fundamental for preserving the relationship and vour own mental health. Here's some guidance to consider as you prepare to talk to mom:

Know Your Intentions

Remind yourself that boundaries aren't about rejection - they're about creating a healthier connection

Ask the Therapist

In "Ask the Therapist" I tackle readers' counselling-related questions big and small, personal or general, by sharing how a therapist might think about your concerns.

If you are asking, "Who is this guy?", I am a retired military chaplain and have completed a master's degree in counselling as part of that role. I have owned/operated two private therapy clinics in southern Manitoba and have worked for several independent counselling agencies. I have a number of advanced certifications in sexuality counselling.

and a better life for you. Approach the conversation with love and respect, focusing on improving the relationship, not ending it. Choose the Right Moment

Timing is key. Discuss boundaries when both of you are calm and in a neutral setting. Avoid bringing it up during or immediately after a negative interaction. Be Člear and

Compassionate Use "I" statements to

express your feelings without blame. For example:

"Mom, I value our relationship but when we always focus on negatives, I feel overwhelmed. Can we talk more about the positives?"

Also bear in mind that mom is so negative likely due to painful events in her formative years. This might lessen anger and generate compassion.

Set and Communicate Limits

Decide what feels manageable and share this clearly. If long conversations are draining, you might say:

"I love catching up but shorter chats work better for me. Let's try keeping our calls to 10 minutes."

Redirect Negative Conversations

When discussions turn negative, gently steer them

to something constructive. For instance:

- "That sounds tough. Is there anything exciting you're looking forward to this week?"

Prepare for Pushback

It is a rare person who likes change. Mom is not likely one of them. If she reacts negatively, remain calm and reaffirm your boundary:

- "I understand this is hard but this is about maintaining a healthy relationship for both of us. Please think about it for a while."

Follow Through Consistently

Boundaries are effective only when upheld. If they're crossed, politely remind her of the conversation and reinforce the limit. Kindly remind her that these boundaries are not up for negotiation.

If mom gets angry, it's important to focus on your responses rather than trying to control mom's reactions.

Steps to Handle Resistance:

1. Stay Calm and Validate Feelings

Acknowledge mom's emotions without compromising the boundary:

- "I can see this is upsetting for you but I need this for my own wellbeing."

2. Reaffirm the Boundary Restate the limit gently but firmly: - "I love you mom but I

am not budging on this." 3. Avoid

Over-Explaining

Boundaries aren't negotiable. Don't get into long defenses or explanations. Keeping explanations brief prevents arguments and confusion.

4. Be Patient with Outcomes

Mom may need time to adjust. Resistance is natural but can lessen as boundaries are consistently maintained.

5. Protect Emotional Energy

If her mom's anger turns into manipulation or disrespect, you can end the interaction calmly:

- "I think we should pause this discussion and talk later when we're both feeling calmer. Have a good day mom."

6. Prioritize Self-Care

If the relationship remains harmful, limiting contact or reassessing its depth may be necessary for your well-being.

I expect this will be harder than you anticipate but it must be done. Let me know how it goes. Stay strong!

While Mary's Dad was stationed at the R.C.A.F near Claresholm, AB, Mary was born on March 1, 1942. Mary, at the age of 10 days, came by train with her parents, Harold and Ella Vines to Crystal City. Mary and her mother lived in part of Kate and Annie Smith's house while her dad was overseas. When Harold's enlistment was up, they moved to N ½ 2-2-11 to farm. Mary was educated at Eton (a one room school that Mary talked very fondly about) and Crystal City.

After high school, Mary worked in Alex Shields' store. She spent the summer of 1963 working for Allan and Muriel Potter north of Pilot Mound. She then joined the staff at the Royal Bank in Crystal City. In 1974, Mary moved to Brandon and worked at Hillcrest Lodge, the Brandon hospital and Spectra Studies

It was there she met Fred Lortie. They married in Crystal City on August 20, 1977. They lived in Alma, Quebec, Portage La Prairie and Winnipeg. Their chosen daughter, Karen Marie, completed their little family.

Mary and Karen moved to Crystal City in 1986. Mary worked in the Homecare Program up until her health deteriorated. When Karen moved to the Toronto, Ontario area, Mary visited as often as she could, enjoying her time with her three grandsons, Adrian, Sage and Chayton.

Mary's passions were needlepoint, crocheting, crafts and knitting. She could whip up an intricate detailed afghan in hours. She was always looking for bargains of wool as she donated a lot of her creations.

Mary moved into the Parkview Lodge in Crystal City where she met and made a lot of close friends. After several falls she made the hard choice of moving into assisted living at the Rock Lake Personal Care Home (PCH) in Pilot Mound. It was the kid who wanted to sit in my lap and talk to me. He was also developmentally disabled and he was very enamoured with Santa. I think it was at that time I realized how much I enjoyed helping Santa and that I wanted to keep doing it for the kids. Santa is magic. He spreads excitement and kindness. He listens to children's hopes and affirms what they want to hear.

How does Santa get around the world so quickly?

Santa has the best reindeer. They are magic and it's easy for them to fly everywhere in one night.

How does Santa fit down the chimney?

Again, magic. I don't know how it works but I just climb in and slide down. If you don't have a chimney, I can come down your vent stack.

Why do some of my toys come from a store and have price tags?

Sometimes at the North Pole, Santa has to make business decisions. Like is it cost effective for the elves to make this toy or would it be more cost effective to buy it in bulk? It's these kind of decisions Santa and his elves make throughout the year. If you have a toy with a price tag, Santa probably bulk purchased it from that store.

Why does Santa have the same wrapping paper as my Mom?

Santa and your Mom love sales on wrapping paper, they must shop at the same store.

What happens when a child pulls your beard? Are they surprised it's not fake?


I only had a few children touch my beard. No one has ever pulled it but there were curious kids who wanted to see

2024 CANADA-SCOTLAND FRIENDSHIP TOUR



THE WORLD'S OLDEST CURLING DOLERITE STONE, 1511



Jackie is holding the Muriel Fage Friendship Trophy, which was awarded to the Canadians. Through all the curling games against the women in different cities and towns across Scotland, the Canadian teams won the series 647 points to 494 - that was the total scores of all of the games.



This is an ice rink, not only a skating arena or only a curling rink, but both. Note the lines for a hockey game and blue goal crease with the circles for a curling house also visible. It is used for skating and hockey on the weekends, then the hacks are put in for curling through the week.

Every ten years Canadian curlers go to Scotland "on the zero" and every ten years "on the 5" Scots come to Canada for the Canada-Scotland Friendship Tour. The next trip will be in 2025 when the Scottish women curlers come to BC. The 2020 tour was just held this past November because of Covid pandemic delays. This Friendship Tour isn't just about seeing the sites and enjoying local cuisine, this is about a great curling rivalry! Women curlers tour the country (Canada or Scotland) curling nearly every day (17 games in 21 days), enjoying the camaraderie of fellow curling enthusiasts and partaking in the local customs, tourist sites and views, drinks and food.

Back in 2019, Jackie McCannell of Pilot Mound applied to Curl-Canada to be part of the Canada-Scotland Friendship Tour. The application contained details of her volunteer roles at curling events (the list would be long from her many years of instructing the junior curlers at Pilot Mound to officiating and

other duties at Canadian national and provincial curling championships), her curling achievements like 5 appearances at the Manitoba Scotties plus national Legion curling playdowns, and the long list of volunteering she has done in the community. She was one of two Manitobans awarded the trip to Scotland. 22 women were on the tour, forming 6 curling teams.

When asked to comment on how it felt to curl in Scotland - the country where curling started centuries ago as part of Team Canada, Jackie wrote, "The experience was a once in a lifetime thing. Once you have competed as Team Canada going to Scotland you aren't eligible to go again. We saw where the first documented curling game took place in Paisley across the street from the Paisley Abbey on February 6, 1540 and also saw the first curling stone used from 1511 in the Stirling Smith Art Gallery & Museum in

Sterling. It was actually surprising how little the Scottish knew about curling considering it originated there. I believe this may be due to how they run their curling association with hand picked persons/teams to represent Scotland plus they have had several venues close over the years so this limits the accessibility for some. They have very few actual curling rinks. Stranraer, Green Acres, Forfar and Aberdeen were the only dedicated curling rinks we curled in, the rest were 'ice rinks'. They skated all weekend then put the hacks back in for curling during the week."

If you followed Jackie's curling journey on Facebook, it was hard not to notice the matching outfits on the Canadian women. "We had matching outfits for everyday on and off the ice; there was a clothing schedule given to us before we left for Scotland. We went as Team Canada and represented this as a group

wearing the same outfits. We had to purchase all of our clothes and air fare. We paid a lump sum up front to cover the costs of our hotel accommodations, meals, admission tickets into our various venues that we all did as a group site seeing and the coach that was hired to drive us all over Scotland. We travelled a total of 2847 km while there. I believe Curl Canada put in \$1000 to put towards the Friendship pins and to go towards all of our brooms that had Team Canada on them with our name."

October 29 Jackie left Winnipeg for 24 days in Scotland. At the opening banquet, a representative of King Charles III sent his greetings to the Canadian contingent.

While on the curling tour she met family members of well-known Scottish curlers. Many Canadians who follow curling would be familiar with Hammy McMillan. Continued pg.24
